Visit the Bellbrook Historical Museum

Visit the Bellbrook Historical Museum located at 42 North Main Street in downtown Bellbrook. Admission is free. The museum is open Wednesdays from 10 am to 2 pm and Saturdays from 12 pm to 4 pm. You can donate to the Museum to help restore artifacts and the museum building.

Museum Unveils Restored Painting

The Bellbrook Historical Museum unveiled a restored oil painting by Della Hopkins Knox. The painting, "The Picture of a Porage Girl," is believed to have been painted around 1880 and was found in poor condition. The Museum Trustees, along with a significant donation from the Bellbrook Sugarcreek Historical Society, were able to have the painting restored at Wiebold Studio near Cincinnati. The painting was framed by Ben Ewbank at Bellbrook Art & Frame located in Bellbrook Plaza. The painting is on display along with other pieces of art and furniture from Della Hopkins Knox. The collection includes a hand carved bench, table, chest, and three-panel screen, all created by Della. The collection also includes a horsehair settee and horsehair chair from Della's home. These items and more were donated to the museum by Della's only daughter, Laura Del Lena Knox Hoss. The Museum Trustees hope to restore the settee and chair.

Della Hopkins Knox was born in 1870 in Spring Valley and was once a resident of Bellbrook. She studied art at the Dermot School for Young Ladies in Xenia. In 1886, Della enrolled in the Art Academy in Cincinnati. When she was 18 years old, she was recognized for her many copies of famous paintings from the Cincinnati Art Museum. Copying museum paintings is a technique often used for learning to paint. She went on to earn a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University in New York. Della married Rev. James McClure Knox and worked in several states teaching art in high schools, hospitals, and department stores. Della continued to teach for much of her life before she died in 1957. Della's works have hung in churches, hotels, and homes throughout the United States.

The Museum has a variety of artifacts from the Bellbrook community which display the history of our area. Come see how our community has developed into what we have today.

Open Arms Health Clinic

Open Arms is a free clinic that provides hope and healing to neighbors in need. The clinic offers medical care to the uninsured and underinsured persons who reside in the areas in and around Bellbrook. Clinic personnel can respond to most acute or chronic medical problems with a diagnosis and treatment plan. Prescription coverage is available up to \$50 per prescription. A general medical care session for all ages is held on Tuesdays from 6 pm to 9 pm. Women's care sessions are held from 9 am to 12 pm on the first and third Fridays of each month. The clinic does not prescribe chronic controlled substances, such as opiates or benzodiazepines. If you are stuck between jobs, marriages etc. and need to see a physician, please call the clinic today. Looking Back on the Bicentennial Celebration

The Bicentennial Committee planned a series of events beginning with the Sugar Maple Festival and ending with the Lions Club Festival in August. The theme of this year's Sugar Maple Festival was "Bellbrook's Bicentennial." The festival emphasized the bicentennial through its many activities. In May, the Chamber of Commerce held the annual Garage Sales and included a community market in Bellbrook Plaza downtown. The Bellbrook Sugarcreek Park District sponsored a community picnic in June at Sackett-Wright Park, which included food trucks and a variety of activities dating back to the 1860s. The centerpiece of the picnic was an authentic 1860s baseball game featuring the Dayton Clodbusters and a team of Bellbrook community members. In July, the Bellbrook Ministerial Association hosted a Community Concert and an Ice Cream Social at Bellbrook Middle School. In August, the Bellbrook Lions Club Festival celebrated the bicentennial with a special fireworks display. The fireworks were funded through private donations. The Bellbrook Sugarcreek Historical Society and the Bellbrook Historical Museum also held an educational series on the history and events that have shaped our community.

City Council Updates

Replatting of Residential Lots In August, City Council approved the replatting of several lots in the Highview Terrace and Shadowood subdivisions. These replats were recommended for approval by the Planning Board.

Property Review Commission The Property Review Commission hears property maintenance cases where the property owner has not resolved the violations as outlined by city staff. The Commission can decide the future enforcement of the Municipal Code for these cases. The Commission heard four cases in August and November.

Chickens Council discussed the topic of chickens on residential lots. After several Council meetings, it was decided to keep the current policy of restricting chickens to agricultural properties of five or more acres.

Waste & Recycling Contract In October, City Council approved a one year extension to the waste and recycling contract. This extension will not increase the current monthly rate of \$13. This is one of the lowest disposal rates of any municipality in the Dayton area.

Personnel Manual City Council approved changes to the Personnel Manual. Changes included wording for the travel reimbursement and vacation policies.

Upper Hillside Water Main Improvement Project City Council has authorized the City Manager to submit an application for grant and loan funding for the Upper Hillside Water Main Improvement Project. The project includes replacing the water main, fire hydrants, and resurfacing the street.

Budget Process City Council has held a series of budget workshops with the City Manager and Department Directors. The workshops have covered the 2017 department operating and capital budgets. Council will vote on the 2017 budget in December. City Council Seat Filled On September 12, the Bellbrook City Council appointed Darryl McGill to fill the vacant Council seat. City Council selected Darryl after an interview process where applications were received from 12 city residents. Darryl's term will begin on October 1 and expire on December 31, 2019. Jon Martin vacated the seat in July when he and his family moved out of the city. Darryl McGill has been active in the Bellbrook community for many years. He and his wife, Karen, have lived in Bellbrook for 12 years. He has served on the board of the Green Meadow Ranch Homeowner's Association, as well as the Board of Zoning Appeals, Planning Board, and Charter Review Commission for the City of Bellbrook. In his professional life, Darryl has extensive experience as a senior business partner in human resources and industrial relations, and has provided strategic guidance to management in steel, automotive, manufacturing, and retail industries. Darryl also holds a certification in human resources management, Six Sigma, and safety.

New Water & Waste Bills Beginning March 2017

Beginning March 1, 2017, the City of Bellbrook will be transitioning to new Utility Billing software. The new software will replace the current system the city has been using for nearly 20 years.



What You Can Expect Utility customers can expect several changes including new statements, new account numbers, and new online access. The city will provide more information to our customers after the start of the new year. You can also visit our website at www.cityofbellbrook.org for more information.

What You Need to Do Keep an eye out for your water bill, which will be processed on either March 1, April 1, or May 2. Also, be on the lookout for communications from us about the transition. Current customers who receive e-statement notifications and/or pay online will have to register their account with the new software provider. Current customers, who pay through their bank's bill payment system, will have to update the payee information with their new customer number found on their statement. This and other information will be coming after the start of the new year.

Waste, Recycling & Yard Waste Disposal



Waste Collection Holidays Waste and recycling collection will **NOT** be delayed to Saturday for the weeks following Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

City Recycling Program The City has a weekly recycling program. Special items are recycled by Greene County Environmental Services who can be contacted at (937) 562-5925. For more information on the recycling program, call the Utility Billing office at (937) 848-4638.

Bulk Pick-up Large items may be picked up by Rumpke on Fridays. However, you must call ahead and schedule with Rumpke at (800) 223-3960.

Yard Waste The City does not have leaf or yard waste collection service. However, residents may dispose of yard waste with regular trash collection. Rumpke will collect brush in bags or tied in bundles no larger than four feet long and two feet wide. Brown paper yard waste bags are not required by Rumpke.

Special Collection One Saturday each month, Greene County Environmental Services holds a special collection for recyclables that are not picked up by Rumpke. Accepted items include household hazardous waste, large household appliances, and scrap metal. Please note this is not an exhaustive list. If you have any questions, please contact Environmental Services at (937) 562-5925.

The Works

Water Tower Repainting The contractor has completed the repainting of the Upper Bellbrook Road water tower. This project included making repairs to the structure, painting the inside of the tower, and painting the exterior of the tower to include the new city logo.

Plantation Trail Culvert The culvert on Plantation Trail between Hillcrest Drive and Bellemeade Drive was replaced this fall. The project included a complete replacement of the structure.

Fire Hydrant Repainting The Service Department is currently in the process of repainting the 600+ fire hydrants on the city's water system.

Freezing Pipes During the upcoming winter months, you may experience frozen water pipes, especially during extremely cold conditions. The following are a few recommendations for preventing pipes from freezing, and for thawing them safely in the event they do freeze.

To Prevent Freezing

- **Managing Pipes:** Leave a cold-water tap running slowly and interior cupboard doors under sinks open, especially if the sink is adjacent to an exterior wall. Shut off and drain pipes leading to outside faucets.
- **Heat and Insulation:** Do not turn the furnace below 55 degrees. Seal leaks that allow cold air inside. Locate and insulate pipes most susceptible to freezing near outside walls, in crawl spaces, and in attics.

To Thaw Frozen Pipes

- **Locate the Freeze:** Locate the suspected frozen area of the water pipe, commonly adjacent to exterior walls, or where your water service enters your home.

- **Apply Heat:** Apply heat to the suspected section of pipe. You can use an electric heating pad, hair dryer, or heater. Note the use of open flame in the home or any confined space is not recommended, due to the fire hazard and risk from combustion fumes.
- If you are unable to locate the frozen section of pipe, or are unsure of what to do, contact a licensed plumber.

When the weather warms up, check unused portions of your water system (for freezing damage and leaks) to avoid possible flooding damage from undetected split pipes.

Snow Removal Tips

As we await winter's colder temperatures, snow and ice, remember to follow these easy and natural snow removal practices:

- Shovel snow before it turns to ice to limit the need for de-icing chemicals, like rock salt.
- Shovel snow onto non-paved surfaces, such as landscaped areas or grass. As the snow melts, it will soak into the ground rather than flow directly into a nearby storm drain or stream.
- Sand, sawdust or ashes can be used as alternatives to commonly used salt products. Cracked corn is another natural alternative to salt.
- After snowmelt, sweep up residues, including sand, to prevent it from washing into storm drains and streams.
- Shoveling snow wisely eliminates ice and snow without harmful chemicals and adds the benefit of physical exercise!

Maintaining Our Streams

How You can Help Bellbrook has a network of streams and drainage ways that carry stormwater to the Little Miami River. To help prevent flooding to neighbors downstream, residents should not put leaves, grass cuttings, or other waste in these features. Yard waste, garbage, or other disturbances to any body of water can cause flooding or damage to the surrounding banks.



Bellbrook is a beautiful city with many enjoyable natural resources. We are blessed with an abundance of good water, natural rolling hills, trees and much native wildlife and foliage. Here are a few things you can do to preserve the natural beauty of our winter season:

- Stabilize or cover any bare areas in your yard so dirt does not erode or run-off.
- Preserve streamside vegetation.
- Clean up and properly dispose of pet waste.
- Minimize the use of salt and chemicals.
- Do not dump anything in the storm sewers - only rain goes down the storm drain!

Drive Thru Child Safety Seat Inspection The Bellbrook Fire Department hosted its 6th annual “Drive Thru Child Passenger Safety Seat Inspection” event on September 24. This event allows parents, grandparents, and caretakers to have their child’s safety seat inspected and installed by a certified Passenger Safety Seat Technician. It is estimated that close to three out of four parents do not properly use child restraints. For this reason, the event stresses the importance of having a child safety seat installed properly. Participants, along with those who stopped by during the event, were provided a free lunch, thanks to generous donations from Dot’s Market. Don’t Wait Check the Date – Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years That was the theme for this year’s Fire Prevention Week which ran from October 9-15. Every smoke alarm has an expiration date: What’s yours?

The Bellbrook Fire Department urges all residents to know how old their smoke alarms are, and to replace them every 10 years. Does your home have a smoke alarm? According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the answer is likely, “yes.” NFPA research shows that most American homes have at least one alarm. But do you know how old your smoke alarms are? If you’re like most people, you’re probably not so sure. To find out how old your smoke alarm is and its expiration date, simply look on the back of the alarm where the date of manufacture is marked. The smoke alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date, not the date the alarm was purchased or installed.

Prior to Fire Prevention Week, Bellbrook Fire Firefighters visited about 1,300 students from pre-school to fifth grade spreading the word about fire safety. We taught students the importance of calling 911, STOP, DROP & ROLL, crawling under smoke, not playing with matches or lighters, practicing home fire drills, knowing where your meeting place is, testing your smoke detector monthly, replacing batteries at least once a year, and “Checking the Date” to replace smoke detectors that are older than 10 years.
