North Belleview Road

The North Belleview Road culvert replacement project is progressing and a contract was awarded at the City Council meeting on July 13. The work will include replacing the twin corrugated metal culvert pipes with a single 28 foot span concrete cast culvert. The removal of the twin pipes and replacement with a



single pipe will improve flow and avoid obstructions from debris. A concrete structure will also have an improved life cycle of 100 years. The crossing will also be widened in order to accommodate the future installation of sidewalks on each side of the road. The guardrails will also be removed due to the new design being much flatter with the grading of the previous steep slopes. The project is estimated to be completed during the month of October. Funding for the project is still being identified with the hopes that the Ohio Public Works Commission Emergency Funding will be available for the project by the start date.

City Received \$120k in CARES Act Funds

At the beginning of July the City received their share of CARES Act funds. These funds were funneled from the state down to the County and then to each municipality. To receive the funds, City Council had to pass a resolution which affirmed proper expenditure of the funds. There are strict guidelines to be followed for the expenditures which were developed at the federal and state level. These funds will be used to reimburse the City for expenditures for personal protective equipment, and technology purchases that enabled remote work and meeting capabilities. The city is also evaluating the creation of its own grant programs that would fall within the guidelines. Although this cannot replace lost revenue for the City from gas and property taxes, it does help to bridge the gap from the unexpected expenses and give us the capability to assist our community.

CARES Grant for Small Businesses

The Greene County Board of County Commissioners have allocated \$500,000 to assist Greene County small businesses that were impacted by COVID-19. Grants will be up to \$10,000. 

Winters-Bellbrook Community Library



Even though COVID-19 had closed the library in March, the Winters-Bellbrook Library continued to look for new, safe ways to support our community. We began offering curbside and walk-up services on May 14th for patrons to pick-up their holds, and we now

do an average of 35 pickups each day. We now offer curated Home Collections, which are 20-75 items selected by librarians for your whole family based on items you've liked in the past. Our Summer Reading program has gone virtual with online reading logs and several virtual programs such as story times and book clubs. Of course, the librarians are always available by phone with questions, requests and suggestions.

With guidance from the Board of Health, we will open our doors with new safety guidelines in place. Staff wear masks, do a daily health screening, and maintain a social distance with other staff and patrons. We offer the first hour of our day (10-11AM) for patrons in vulnerable populations. We moved our hold shelf to the public area and added a self-check station for patrons who want to pick up their items quickly. We also have guided route around the building to help maintain that social distancing. We are all in this together, and know that together we can keep Bellbrook safe and continue to serve the community.



Bellbrook Mountain Land Proposal

The City of Bellbrook was presented with an interest to purchase or lease approximately 16 acres of City owned land back in June of 2019 for use by Bellbrook Mountain. Numerous discussions occurred related to the proposed uses of the land which included a 200 car parking lot, tube runoff and other structures related to the business.

City Council evaluated the land acquisition on numerous occasions and did not express an interest to pursue it further as it is not considered surplus land and is located on the City's wellfield. This was communicated to the individual who made the proposal in a letter dated June 15, 2020 As stated in the letter, the discussions were only related to the sale or lease of city owned land and did not give an opinion or evaluation of the proposed business plan.

The City has encouraged the individuals pursuing Bellbrook Mountain to continue to do so.

City Council Meetings went Virtual

City Council began meeting virtually in April via Zoom which was also streamed to our cable channel and YouTube at the same time! Our meetings were always broadcast to cable live but the YouTube videos were always posted a few days later after processing. We were thankful that we were able to offer both live streaming options and are working to be able to continue to do so even after we begin meeting in person again and are no longer using Zoom.

Outdoor Fires

As summer activities continue, it is important to remain aware of the do's & don'ts of having recreational fires. Only use clean, dry wood for fires. No trash, yard waste, paper with printed ink, or anything plastic is to be used for fires. Recreational fires must be located at least 25 feet from a structure or combustible materials, and no larger than 2 feet in width. When finished, extinguish coals with water and leave hot materials untouched for 24 hours. Do not bag or dispose of the materials until they are completely out.


About the Service Department

The Service Department operates and maintains the water system serving the city and part of Sugarcreek Township. Currently, the city has one employee with a Class 2 Operator's License and five employees with a Class 1 Operators License. The Ohio EPA requires the city to have a minimum of one employee with a Class 1 Operator's License. The water system serves over 9,000 people in the city and township. The department also maintains city streets, storm sewers, and city buildings.

Hydrant Flushing

The annual fire hydrant flushing will occur the week of October 7th through October 11th from 8:30AM to 3:30PM daily.

Fire hydrant flushing is necessary for the general maintenance of the City's water system. It is also important to check the hydrants



Please avoid doing laundry during this time. If discoloration of laundry occurs, a special detergent is available from the City. If you use a water softener, please set it to "by-pass" during this week. Water may appear "rusty" during the process, but will return to normal when the process is complete. Please call 848-4638 with any questions.

Beechwood Drive Culvert Relining

In late June a 60 inch culvert located near 3980 Beechwood Drive was relined. The existing culvert was made of galvanized metal and was starting to fail due to age. The contractor cut out areas of deterioration, rebuilt it with wire mesh and then sprayed layers of concrete over it. This process reinforces the culvert and allows for better

flow of water to prevent a failure of the structure. This project was part of the 2020 Capital Improvement Program authorized by City Council.

Proper Disposal of Natural Debris

The season for yard work has been upon us now for some time and it is important to remind residents NOT to toss debris of any type into the creeks, streams or rivers. Even natural debris such as leaves and limbs can create damaging clogs which can lead to structure failures. Ordinance 1060.07 specifically states that:

"No person shall deposit, or cause to be deposited, sort, scatter or leave, any rubbish, earth, ashes, cinders, sawdust, ice, glass, manure, filth, paper, dirt, grass, leaves, twigs, brush, garbage or other offensive material in any public street or public property of the City, or on any private property, except on approved private or public dumps."

City of Bellbrook & Stormwater

The City of Bellbrook naturally frequent water runoff from storm events. **Stormwater** is defined as any water that is not soaked into the ground after a rainstorm. When subdivisions are built, they create impermeable surfaces that speed up and relocate the natural drainage of water (think of your roof, your driveway, sidewalk, and street).

Stormwater drainage facilities are conventionally installed to manage stormwater and often cross over individual properties and are required by the City or review-entity to ensure that residents of these subdivisions are not flooded because of the development. These drainage ways are typically marked by drainage easements or by buffers on the recorded property record. These easements are vital to ensuring that the storm facilities are maintained.

A new homeowner may not be aware of an easement on their property and they will land-scape without knowing the possible consequences. It is the homeowner's responsibility when purchasing the property to research whether it contains such easements or facilities. In Ohio law a property owner has a right to manage stormwater on their land, however they cannot cause another property to flood. Often there are stipulations on what you can modify in these buffers or easements that can be found in your Covenants and Restrictions.




Figure 1: Sugar Leaf subdivision drainage easements
